THE WEATHER.—The month begins mild, but fog and sheet prevail, and some storms about the 2d day. 4th, cloudy, 5th, high winds, and rain. 6th and 7th, cold and stormy. 8th, cold air, frosty. 9th, fair, mild. 10th to 12th, high winds, meteors, lightning, frosty. 14th, rain. 16th to 19th, cold increases. Frost and many changes this month. 30th to 12th, stormy period, meteors.

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PREDICTIONS.—The King of Prussia has some excellent influences this month. His schemes succeed, his troops are successful, honours await him. The two malefic stars, Saturn and Uranus, come together in the ruling sign of Ireland; and some desperate and deep-laid plots break forth. Troubles reign also in Poland, Palermo, the Archipelago, and in Persia; where earthquakes bring awful ruin, and political shocks become not less frequent. From the 14th to the 26th will be a time of fearful phenomena; storms, tempests, &c. The plot thickens against Louis Napoleon, if still alive; for the conjunction of Saturn and Uranus on the 16th day falls close to the opposition of the Moon's place at noon on the day of his birth; and some sudden misfortune will attend his steps. THE WEATHER.—Cloudy and showery at first, 4th and 5th, fair and warmer. 6th and 7th, cloudy, shower. 9th, thunder and hail. 10th, showery. 11th and 12th, fair. 13th, cooler. 14th and 15th, fair; some rain. 17th and 18th, cloudy, windy. 19th to 21st, storms prevail; thunder and hail, much rain. 22d, still unsettled; rain. 23d and 24th, fairer. 25th, cloudy and windy; thunder. 27th, fair and warm. 28th, cloudy, showers. 29th and 30th, unsettled, thunder storms, wind, and meteor. Opposition of Saturn and Jupiter on the 20th will mark the atmosphere for some days about that period, maskable meteors at the end; not a good hay-month.

PREDICTIONS.—The peculiar positions at the ingress of the Sun in Cancer, where the Moon, rising in Leo, is in exact square to Jupiter and Saturn from angles, begin now to operate. Violence still reigns in France, and bloodshed occurs in Paris, Lyons, &c. Ireland is still disturbed about religious questions. Rome is weak, and the Ottoman Empire replete with turmoil and troublous insurrections and suffering from physical evils. London is full of active business, trade good, and science flourishing. The powers that be are now entangled with change that they have not courage to make efficient. The King of Sweden is warlike and successful. Some singular changes are now taking place in France, where the people wheel round more suddenly than is even usual in the fickle nation. Clerical questions are not yet laid quite aside, and the land, though more peaceful, still bears marks of agitation. The people are healthy. The ruling powers are still warlike, and seem disposed to contention.

NOTES

JUPITER.—This planet, in addition to its four satellites or moons, which present a very beautiful appearance when viewed through a telescope, is likewise surrounded by several streaky appearances, or zones, each ending across its disc, in lines parallel to its equator. These are generally termed *clouds*. Three of these zones, slightly removed from each other, are most frequently observed; but they are not, however, constant, in their appearance. Sometimes only one is to be seen, sometimes five, and sometimes seven or eight have been visible; they occasionally vary, both in number and breadth. Jupiter will be in opposition to the Sun on the 8th of May, and can then be observed on the meridian at midnight. In March, this planet may be seen to ascend in the eastern horizon, about 11 o'clock at night; it will continue to rise earlier every evening, and in August it will be approaching the western horizon, about 9 o'clock at night. In October it may be seen to set, an hour or two after the Sun.

MARS will be in opposition to the Sun on the 24th of April, and consequently may then be advantageously observed at midnight. During April, Mars may be seen descending low down after sunset. In October and November, it comes nearly with Jupiter, and then it is

Structure.—This planet, which from its proximity to the Sun is seldom to be seen, may be observed to rise a little before the Sun near end of January, and to set after that luminary about the 9th of April. He may likewise be seen to rise a little before the Sun the last week in May, and about the 29th of September; and to set after the Sun near the 7th of August and the early part of December.
